Speed Detection Device in Place

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Speed Detection Device in Place

Maintaining a safe environment for all students, faculty, staff and guests is the number one priority of the Campus Police. The recent purchase of a speed detection device has further enabled us to reach this very important goal. The Galaxy RS-20 Radar Speed Display Sign, as it is more popularly known, is the perfect solution for cautioning drivers of their speed, while making the campus safe for pedestrian

traffic. The RS-20 uses high output LEDs with a luminous intensity which is visible up to 750 feet. With a dust and waterproof display cabinet, the device can be used during inclement weather, including rain. The regulatory sign can be used in all areas on campus as it has interchangeable speed signs, variable from 5 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour. The entire unit weighs in at only 130 lbs and is easily moved and set up

anywhere on campus. Although Campus Police enforce speed limits on campus by use of radar units mounted in all campus police vehicles, the speed detection device is used to warn drivers of the posted speed limits, hopefully preventing citations for speeding and making the campus streets safer for pedestrians.

Get the 411, What to do in an Emergency



All too often people do not know what to do when an emergency occurs on campus. Keep in mind the following guidelines when reacting to a campus emergency:

1. Fire or Smoke:

Activate the nearest alarm pull station and exit building using the quickest/shortest exit route. Do not use elevators. When exiting, cut off lights, secure doors to offices/classrooms, and take

personal items with you. Instructors should ensure all students have exited prior to leaving and assist individuals with disabilities.

2. Bomb Threat:

When a bomb threat is received by phone, the call taker should report pertinent information to the Campus Police such as time and date call was received, detonation time, when the call ended, exact wording of person making call and a description of

their voice. During bomb threats, the Campus Police initiate building evacuations by use of the fire alarm systems. Once a building is evacuated, the public will be moved a safe distance from the building and the building searched by key college personnel. The building will not be re-entered until the "all clear" sign is given.

Emergencies Continued:

3. Tornado:

Shelter in place, away from windows. You are safer in a building than attempting to venture outside. Campus Police will keep key personnel updated on weather conditions as they improve or worsen.

4. Emergency Medical Assistance:

Campus Police officers are trained first responders and

have received in-depth training in CPR and use of AED. In the case of a medical emergency, contact 911 and call Campus Police at 526-1427 or extension 1427 from any campus office phone.

5. Suspicious Mail or Package:

If you receive a suspicious article of mail or package, notify Campus Police immediately. Do not

handle or disturb suspicious mail/packages or other items. Do not use cell phones, walkie-talkies, or other radio devices if you are within 150 feet of a potential explosive device. Notification should be made by landline only. Campus Police will handle suspicious items or potential bio-hazardous items as per college policy.
