### Campus Crime Report – Police Blotter

Daily, Campus Police officers complete a log of all criminal offenses reported on campus. This is a short synopsis of some police calls on campus for the month of November.

November 9 – Officers were called to building 152 in reference to a staff member who was ill. Officers arrived and provided first aid until arrival of Killeen EMS. The staff member was transported to a local hospital for observation.

November 9 – Officers were called to building 152 in reference to a student who had a tire blow out on her car and collided with a pole. The student was not injured as a result of the accident.

November 15 – A student

reported that she left her purse in building 119 and persons unknown removed it without her permission.

November 15 – Officers were dispatched to building 104 in reference to a non-responsive female. Officers arrived and CPR was in progress by two other CTC students. Campus Police used an AED to defibrillate the female. Upon arrival of Killeen EMS, the student was transported to Darnall Army Community Hospital for treatment.

November 16 – Officers were dispatched to building 151, Gym, in reference to a student who was suffering from a seizure. Officers arrived and tended to the student until arrival of Killeen EMS. The student refused to be

taken to the hospital.

November 17 – A female student reported that her ex-boyfriend, also a student, had been harassing her for several months. The incident is a joint investigation with the Killeen PD.

November 17 – Two female students were arguing outside building 118. When one of the students attempted to leave the scene in her car the other student stepped in front of the moving vehicle. The student victim was not injured and the incident was handled as a pedestrian/vehicle accident.

November 18 – A student reported that while at the Killeen Bowl-a-rama she received a threatening phone call via her cellular phone. The student was referred to Killeen PD.

## Police Blotter Continued:

November 18 – a student reported he dropped his cellular phone outside the library along with his bookbag. The student went into the library to get a book and when he returned to retrieve his bookbag, his phone was missing. There are no suspects or witnesses in this case.

November 19 – A student reported that his keys were missing from his dorm room. The keys were later located in the lobby. It is unknown who removed them from his room.

November 20 – A student

reported that his keys were missing from his dorm room, again the keys were located in the lobby. It is unknown who removed them from his room.

November 22 – An unknown male called the cafeteria during lunch time and reported that a bomb was in the building. The building was evacuated and a search met with negative results. The incident is being investigated as a Terroristic Threat.

November 22 – A staff member reported that sometime while he was at work person(s) unknown

entered his vehicle, which was parked in parking lot F, by breaking a vent window and removed a pair of Kmart tennis shoes. The value of the theft is \$20. There are no suspects or witnesses in this case.

November 27 – Officers responded to a report of theft in the dorm. A student resident reported that another student resident had removed property from his room without permission. A suspect has been identified and an arrest warrant was subsequently issued for the student.

## AED a Proven Life Saver

*In September of this year the Campus Police purchased its second AED. AED or scientifically known as an Automated External Defibrillator, were first introduced about 8 years ago for public use. The AED could be purchased by government, state and private companies for use in public buildings. Although the use of AED eventually caught on, the price of a single unit was more than most companies could afford at that time since the technology was new and the prices were high. With most units running between \$3,500 to \$5,000 not many AED units were seen. In early 2000 the majority of public buildings within larger municipalities were being equipped with AED units. CTC saw its first AED in early 2000.*

*The initial unit was purchased by the Risk Management Department and maintained by the CTC Nursing Department. In September of this year the Campus Police received training in CPR which included a block of instruction in AED. It was at that time that the Campus Police began transporting the AED units in their patrol vehicles.*

*As fate would have it, on November 15 at approximately 6 pm, officers were dispatched to building 104 in reference to a non-responsive female, CPR in progress. Upon the officers arrival they observed two students giving CPR to another student who was not breathing and had no pulse. Quick thinking officers retrieved the AED from their patrol vehicle and*

*applied the unit to the student. The AED analyzes heart function and the machine advised a “shock” was needed. The officers shocked the student. The machine analyzed the student and advised to continue CPR. The machine again analyzed the student and determined that an additional shock was needed. At the second shock the student regained a heart rhythm and was transported to a local hospital by Killeen EMS.*

*Although in this case the student’s life was saved by use of the AED, the unit is not fool proof and will not always deliver a “save”, depending on the individual’s medical history. In this case we were fortunate to have the AED available for use on Campus.*
