Campus Crime Report—Police Blotter

REMEMBER:

To obtain a parking permit on campus you must

provide:

1. Current Drivers License.
2. State vehicle registration paperwork.
3. Class schedule or student/staff ID.

All vehicles parked in campus must display a parking permit. Temporary permits are available.

January 28—A vehicle parked in parking lot E was struck by an unknown vehicle while it was legally parked. The suspect vehicle left the scene without reporting the accident.

January 31—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a student who had entered another student's room and rifled through his belongings. The resident did not file charges because the student was a friend who was looking for his own clothing.

February 4—While completing administrative duties for the college, a patrol officer observed an accident in the park-

ing lot of a bank in Killeen. The officer stood by until arrival of a KPD officer.

February 12—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a student who was possibly suicidal. The student was gone when the officers arrived but later voluntarily went to a local hospital for evaluation.

February 14—Officers were contacted by Child Protective Services in reference to an infant who resides in Housing who was taken to a local hospital with severe head injuries. The case was screened by the Coryell County Attorney's office and a Felony arrest warrant for

Injury to a Child was issued by Judge Price for a parent. The child was taken into custody by CPS and placed into foster care pending a court hearing.

February 16—Officers were called to building 103 in reference to a staff member who was feeling ill. The staff member was taken to a local hospital by a family member.

February 16—Officers were called to building 104 in reference to a student who was having a seizure. The student was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

Due to February being a short reporting month, Campus crime information and the Police blotter for February were consolidated into the March issue.

February 22—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a possible Burglary of a Coin Operated Machine. Upon arrival officers discovered that one of the money boxes had been removed from a clothes dryer. There are no suspects however video surveillance tapes were being reviewed for more information.

February 24—Officers were called to parking lot J in reference to a hit-and-run accident. Persons unknown struck a legally parked car and left the scene without reporting the

accident. A possible suspect has been identified.

February 27—Officers were called to the Agriculture Barn in reference to a deceased animal. A newborn foal had gotten stuck in the mud and died.

March 1—Officers arrested a student for an outstanding traffic warrant out of Killeen. The subject was transported to the Killeen City Jail.

March 2—Officers were called to building 118 in reference to a complaint on an instructor. The complaint was referred to the

administration for action.

March 2—Officers were advised of a theft that occurred in the Gym. A CTC staff members jewelry was removed from the Faculty/Staff locker room while she was using the facilities. There are no suspects at this time.

March 8—A student reported that while his car was parked in parking lot D, unknown persons keyed the paint job. There are no suspects or witnesses.

March 22—During a routine traffic stop the driver of a vehicle was found to have warrants



Issued by Bell County. The subject was arrested and transported to the County jail.

March 23—Officers were called to Housing in reference to a grease fire. The fire was extinguished prior to arrival to the fire department. Minimal smoke damage occurred to the apartment and no one was injured.

March 23—Officers were called

to building 103 in reference to a student who was having back trouble. The student was transported by ambulance to a local hospital for treatment.

March 24—Officers were called to building 103 in reference to a theft that occurred in the staff lounge. A possible suspect has been identified.

March 26—Officers were called to housing for a domestic dis-

pute. One party agreed to leave for the night.

March 28—Officers discovered a wrecked abandoned vehicle on campus. The vehicle was towed to a local storage facility.

March 28—Officers were called to building 152 for a student who passed out. The student was taken to a local hospital for treatment.
