Simple Steps for Registering Your Car to Park on Campus

If you drive a car to class and park it on campus, then you are required to obtain a parking permit for parking on Central Campus. Fort Hood Students and satellite campus students who frequent Central Campus for use of the Library, Gym or to take tests must also display a parking permit. Parking permits are free and can be obtained anytime at the Campus Police office or during normal Fall and Spring registration in the Registration Building. You may register as many vehicles as you may have to drive to class, however each vehicle must have a separate parking permit since permits are not transferable from one vehicle to another.

To obtain a parking permit you must have:

- 1. Current Drivers License;**
- 2. The state vehicle registration papers, not insurance; and**
- 3. Your current class schedule or student ID card.**

All CTC Faculty and Staff are also required to register their vehicles with the Campus Police and obtain a parking permit. Parking permits are free, do not expire and only have to be replaced upon changing vehicles. Temporary parking permits are available for new car buyers or for temporary transportation. Open parking is available in all parking lots; reserve parking is designated for faculty and staff only. For more information on parking see the CTC Police web link at: www.ctcd.edu/pd_index.htm

Campus Crime Report – Police Blotter

June 2 – Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to a civil disturbance between neighbors. The disturbance was resolved and referred to the Housing Manager.

June 6 – Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to criminal mischief, graffiti, which was written on the door of one of the residents. This case may be related to the previous incident. Investigation continues.

June 7 – A CTC staff member reported receiving harassing, obscene email communications, possibly from an ex-employee. The incident has been related to several previous reports of harassment on campus. Investigation continues.



June 11 – An officer assisted the Fort Hood Department of the Army Police on Clear Creek Drive and US 190 with a traffic stop. The officers returned to campus when the scene was clear.

June 13 – Officers were called to the Bookstore in reference to a male subject who was causing a civil disturbance. Subject was gone upon the officers arrival.

June 13 – Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to a domestic disturbance between husband and wife. Upon arrival the officers discovered the husband had been assaulted by the wife. The wife was arrested for Domestic Violence and transported to the county jail.

June 21 – Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to checking on the welfare of a 2 year old child. The mother and child were located and were deemed to be fine.

June 22 – Officers were called to a fight behind building 111. Upon arrival officers met with a staff member who stated he was assaulted by another staff member. Neither subject wanted to pursue criminal charges. Incident was referred to their supervisor for action.

June 23 – Officers were called to Morton Hall, building 120, in reference to an assault. The subjects were separated and the aggressor was issued a Justice of the Peace citation for Assault by Contact. The incident was also referred to the CTC Administration for action.

June 27 – Officers were called to building 104 in reference to a female student who was in labor. EMS was notified and transported her to a local hospital.

June 30 – Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to an assault by threat. The incident ensued over a reserved parking space. Investigation continues.
