CTCPD Sponsors it's First Cadets Since 1996

Central Texas College Police Department recently sponsored two people to attend the Central Texas Regional Police Academy. This sponsorship is a first for the department since 1996 and although it doesn't guarantee employment with the CTCPD, it does give a prospective recruit the opportunity to become licensed in the State of Texas as a Peace Officer. In order for a person to attend the Basic Police Officers Course (BPOC) on campus one must be employed as a police recruit, prospective recruit, or prospective reserve peace officer, who have been processed as an applicant and meet the enrollment standards for admission and licensing as a peace officer in Texas. Sharon Bee and Yvonne Togiai had to endure a criminal background check, medical and drug screening and a psychological exam before they were accepted into the academy. CTC absorbed the cost of their tuition and committed the use of a fully equipped patrol unit during the block of instruction for pursuit driving. Both Bee and Togiai were treated like one of the guys and had to compete against fellow classmates not only in pursuit driving but also on the firing range and in the gym during Use of Force training. The entire course for BPOC lasts approximately 18 weeks and upon successful completion the "cadets" receive 20 hours of college credit and are eligible to take the Texas State licensing exam to obtain certification as a Peace Officer for the State of Texas. Once licensed, cadets can apply for employment at any Police Department in the State of Texas as a Police Officer.



CAMPUS POLICE BLOTTER DECEMBER 2005

December 1—An officer was called to Married Housing reference to possible child neglect. The officer met with the housing manager who was in possession of a 6 year old child who was left home alone after school. The parent was notified and the case referred to Child Protective Services. Investigation continues.

December 6—An officer was called to the parking lot next to Morton Hall in reference to a domestic disturbance between husband and wife. The disturbance was over custody of the family vehicle. The male subject, is a campus student resident currently separated from his non-student wife. The pair was separated and the wife was removed from campus.

December 6—A student came to the campus police department to report a motor vehicle hit and run accident. Person(s) unknown struck her legally parked vehicle while she attended class. No witnesses or suspects at this time.

December 10—A resident of Morton Hall reported receiving harassing phone calls on his answering machine. A possible suspect has been identified, criminal charges may be pending.

December 12—An officer responded to building 101 in reference to a medical emergency. EMS was notified and transported the student to a local hospital for treatment.

December 12—An officer responded to the Gym, building 151, in reference to a student who was injured. EMS was notified and transported the student to a local hospital for treatment.

December 15—Officers were called to Morton Hall for an activated fire alarm. Upon arrival with the Killeen Fire Department it was determined that steam from a radiator had set off the alarm. No injuries reported.

CAMPUS POLICE BLOTTER JANUARY 2006

January 06—Officers were called to building 101 in reference to a multimedia projection which was missing from a classroom. No signs of forced entry to the classroom and a possible suspect has been identified. Investigation continues.

January 10—Officers responded to the report of a theft of an electrical generator power pack stored behind the CTC warehouse. There are no suspects or witnesses at this time. Investigation continues.

January 11—Officers were called to the Nursing and Science Building #150, in reference to a student who was having a seizure. EMS was notified and transported the student to a local hospital for treatment.

January 11—Officers were called to building 117, CTC Child Development Center, in reference to a theft from the construction site. A contractor reported a laser level was taken over the weekend. There are no suspects or witnesses at this time. Investigation continues.

January 11—An officer discovered an ill student in front of the Student Center, building 106. EMS was notified and the student was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

January 14—Officers responded to Morton Hall to assist the Resident Assistant with a student who was depressed and possibly suicidal. A mental health referral was made to Metroplex Hospital and to the CTC Substance Abuse Resource Director for counseling.

January 15—Officers were called to Married Housing for a civil disturbance between a tenant and his sister. The sister, a non-student non-resident, was gone upon the officers arrival but has been positively identified.

January 17—A CTC staff member reported several long distance phone calls were made from her office phone without permission. A suspect has been identified. Investigation continues.

January 18—Officers received a report of Cruelty to Animals in the area of Metroplex Hospital. Several Nutria had been slain or injured. Investigation continues.

January 18—An officer discovered an ill student in her car. EMS was notified and the student was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

January 19—Officers were called to the Student Center in reference to a student who was having a seizure. EMS was notified and the student was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

January 19—Officers responded to a hit and run vehicle accident in the Student Center Parking lot. A CTC staff member reported that person(s) unknown struck her legally parked vehicle and left the scene without reporting the accident.

January 26—Officers responded to assist the Highway Patrol with a major accident on the highway which involved 5 vehicles. The officers assisted with traffic control.

January 27—Officers responded to a civil disturbance at the duck pond between family members over a child custody exchange. One subject was injured when attempting to retrieve her child from another family member. Criminal charges are pending.

January 27—Officers were called to Married Housing in reference to a small child who had gotten injured. EMS was called but the family refused transport via ambulance and opted to take her to the doctor by POV.

January 27—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a student who was receiving harassing phone calls. A possible suspect has been identified. Investigation continues.

January 29—An officer stopped a vehicle in Married Housing after it almost struck the patrol vehicle. The vehicle operator was found to be driving with a suspended drivers license. The subject was arrested, transported and booked into the Coryell County Jail without incident.

January 30—Officers responded to the Campus Police Department, building 137, in reference to a subject who was complaining of abdominal pain. EMS was notified and the subject transported to a local hospital for treatment.
