### ***POLICE WELCOME NEW PATROL VEHICLE***

Campus Police welcomed the newest member of their vehicle fleet a 2008 Ford Crown Victoria Police Interceptor. The new addition brings the campus police vehicle fleet to two Crown Victoria's one Ford Explorer, one 2005 Honda TXR350 all terrain vehicle (ATV) and two police mountain bikes. The campus police maintain daily vehicular patrols and supplement that patrol with the use of bikes and the ATV. Weather permitting the police are more visible when patrolling via the bikes and ATV and make for a more approachable police squad. When you see the campus police out patrolling, flag them down and get to know them, they are here to provide you a safe and secure place to live and learn.

### **CAMPUS POLICE BLOTTER APRIL AND MAY 2007**

April 3—A student resident of Morton Hall struck the bathroom door with a golf club, putting a hole in the door. The student was fined \$210.00 and referred to the CTC Administration for disciplinary action.

April 4—Officers were called to building 150 in reference to a student who was assaulted by an unknown person for a road rage incident that occurred on Fort Hood.

April 5—A student reported that person(s) unknown removed his cell phone from his parked vehicle while he was at the gym.

April 5—Officers investigating a hit and run accident on US 190 where one victim left the scene of the accident; accident referred to Killeen Police.

April 5—Officers assisted the Temple Police department in locating a juvenile runaway out of their agency. The runaway was not located on campus.

April 9—Two students were cited for disruption of class for an argument that occurred in the Academic Building, #104. Both students were issued a citation and also referred to the CTC Administration for disciplinary action.

April 10—While a student was at the gym someone removed two hubcaps from his parked car, no witnesses or suspects noted.

April 10—A report of a suspicious person revealed they were wanted on arrest warrants out of Copperas Cove Police Department, subject was arrested, transported and booked into the city jail.

April 11—Officers conducted a welfare check on a student who resides in student housing and had been depressed. The student was located and reported to be fine.

April 13—Officers were called to Married Student Housing in reference to a resident who was complaining of chest pains. The subject was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

April 13—While on routine patrol officers came upon a vehicle parked at the CTC duck pond occupied by two female non-students. One of the subjects was a minor and released to the custody of her parents. The adult female was issued a JP citation and released.

April 19—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a theft. A dorm student reported that someone had taken her robe out of the laundry room while she was washing clothes; the case was later unfounded when the robe was found in her dorm room.

April 23—Officers were called to building 118 in reference to a domestic disturbance between boyfriend and girlfriend. The female subject was instructed to leave the premises and both individuals were referred to the CTC Administration for disciplinary action.

April 26—Officers were called to building 106 in reference to a student having a seizure. EMS was called however the student refused to go to the hospital.

April 26—Officer assisted the Nolanville and Killeen Police Department in a vehicle pursuit in which the vehicle operator fled on foot across campus. The subject was detained by two CTC employees and held by CTC Police until arrival of the KPD officer. Subject was arrested and taken to the Killeen jail.

April 26—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a domestic disturbance between boyfriend and girlfriend. Both subjects left the area prior to the arrival of police. The female student returned to the dorm later that evening unharmed.





May 2—Officers were called to the area of US 190 in front of the college in reference to a 10 year old female child walking unattended on the highway. The child was not located however she was located unharmed in Killeen later that evening.

May 5—Officers were called to Morton Hall in reference to a student who had been barred from the dorm and had returned. The subject was located and was issued a criminal trespass warning prior to being escorted off campus.

May 14—Officers were called to building 101 in reference to the theft of soft drinks from a vending machine. It is unknown exactly when the theft occurred and no suspects or witnesses were noted.

May 21—A staff member reported that she had been receiving harassing phone calls from a subject who resides out of state; no threats had been made.

May 22—A student reported that person(s) unknown removed a video game from his backpack while in the gym. No suspects or witnesses were noted.

May 24—A felony forgery case was reported to the Campus Police via the CTC accounting office. Both Killeen and Copperas Cove Police Departments are investigating similar cases and they may be connected. Investigation continues.

May 30—Officers were called to building 136, Tarleton University-Central in reference to a student who fell and was injured. Killeen EMS was notified and upon their arrival the student was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

## CAMPUS POLICE BLOTTER JUNE AND JULY 2007

June 5—Officers were called to building 104 in reference to a student who fainted. Killeen EMS was notified and the student was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

June 6—Officer was dispatched to UP 190 in front of the college in reference to a female walking barefoot on the highway. The female was located and she advised that she had just been released from Metroplex Hospital. The female was given a courtesy ride to Copperas Cove.

June 7—A staff member reported that sometime during the Summer I semester person(s) unknown removed a TV/VCR valued at \$50.00 from one of the classrooms. There are no witnesses or suspects noted.

June 26—Officers received a report that sometime during the month of June several items from the Planetarium gift shop came up missing. There are no suspects or witnesses noted at this time.

July 3—A civil problem between two Tarleton State University-Central employees was reported to campus police. This is an on-going domestic dispute.

July 5—Officers were summoned to building 121 in reference to a subject having chest pains. EMS was called however the subject refused to go to the hospital.

July 6—Officers were called to building 111 in reference to a staff member who had fainted. Subject was taken to a local hospital by Killeen EMS.

July 9—Officers responded to a threat in building 111. The building was evacuated however the threat proved to be a hoax.

July 10—A student reported that while in the gym he left his two cell phones on a bench and when he returned they were gone. There are no witnesses or suspects.

July 19—Officers were called to the breezeway of building 104 in reference to two students fighting. Upon arrival officers identified the two subjects as API students. Both students were restricted to their classroom in building 121 and a disciplinary referral sent to the API Administrator.

July 19—A student reported that while he car was parked in lot C at building 101, person(s) unknown damaged the roof with a large dent. There are no suspects.

July 20—Officers were called to Morton Hall, building 120, in reference to a fire alarm. It was determined that a student burnt food in the microwave and the smoking food caused the alarm to activate.

July 23—Officers were called to building 118 for cruelty to animals. It was reported that person(s) unknown put an unidentified substance, possibly rat poison, in the food bowls set outside the building for the stray cats. There are no witnesses or suspects.

July 23—Officers were called to building 101 for a student who was complaining of hip pain. EMS was notified and the student taken to a local hospital for treatment.

July 24—Officers were called to the Academic building #104 in reference to a computer monitor that was missing. The monitor was valued at \$200 and was last seen during the Summer I semester. There are no suspects or witnesses noted.

July 26—Officers were called to building 101 in reference to Disruption of Class. A GED student was located and it was determined that he was not attending any of the class rooms which he was going into. The student gave police false information pertaining to his identity. The student was arrested and taken to the county jail.

July 26—A student reported that she left her wallet in building 104 and when she returned it was gone. There are no suspects or witnesses noted.

## Central Texas College Police 10th Annual National Night Out

*August 7th will be the 10th Annual National Night Out for the Central Texas College campus. Each year the Campus Police provide an evening of fun, food and activities for the residents of Married Student and Single Parent Housing and Morton Hall dormitory. National Night Out is a national community policing project designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness in communities throughout the nation. Its efforts are sending a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back to prevent crime. Dr. James A.
