#### **“Simulation Technology in the Classroom: Advancing Medical Education”**

Simulation is a training and feedback method in which learners practice tasks and processes in lifelike circumstances using models or virtual reality. Medical simulators allow individuals to review and practice procedures as often as required to reach proficiency without harming the patient. In this program for all healthcare providers including nurses, physicians, and allied health professionals across a variety of disciplines, we will explore the pros and cons of medical simulation in the classroom. Several tools and approaches will be highlighted, including patient simulators, task trainers, and computer-based medical simulation.
