What To Look For When Evaluating Resources

AUTHORITY: Who wrote this? What are his/her credentials? Does the author have a degree related to field of topic? Is biographical information included about the author?

PUBLISHER: Is the publisher a university press or high-quality commercial publisher? Or a publisher of general and popular works intended for the mass market?

ACCURACY: Are citation, footnotes, or bibliography present? Is the research well-documented? Are there typographical errors or broken links in websites? Is the website up to date?

OBJECTIVITY: What is the purpose of this piece? What is the author's point of view? Is the author biased or unbiased? Is author trying to persuade or inform? What is the journal's affiliations?

AUDIENCE: For whom was it written? Is it targeted to an audience of scholars, researchers, or graduate students or the general public? What kind of verbiage is being used (advanced, technical, or basic)?

SCOPE: Does the article focus on a general topic? Or does it focus on a narrow, specialized topic?
